Mobile Ministries Goes Northwest

Since 2007 **Fran Stevenson** has served as a CBF Global Missions field personnel in her home town of Fremont, California, advocating for Afghan refugee families. When her **husband Pete** retired after working 35 years for the Bay Area Rapid Transit system (BART), they merged their love for camping and their heart for missions and took to the road. Living in their camper-trailer, the Stevensons utilize Fran’s social ministries experience and Pete’s craftsman/handyman skills to be the presence of Christ in various CBF ministry locations. They have taken their “mobile ministries” to FL, NC, and to work with two CBF congregations in MT and ID.

Settling their trailer at a campground near Yellowstone National Park, Fran and Pete spent several weeks working with First Baptist Church of West Yellowstone, Montana. They enjoyed the pioneer spirit and tender heart of Pastor Benny McCracken who rides a red bike around town and is well known in the community. Pete fixed broken heaters, mounted cupboards, organized an outdoor shed, moved a broken refrigerator (later gifted to a church member) and fixed minor leaking faucets and pipes. Fran cleaned out storage areas, washed laundry left from summer volunteers, participated in a women’s luncheon, signed a worship song, and listened as the church brainstorm ways to make a difference in their community. With the only thrift store in town recently closing its doors, the church sought ways to help meet the community’s clothing needs for the coming winter. Fran shared about a CBF ministry in North Carolina conducted by LaCount Anderson that operates a very successful thrift store ministry.

Transitioning to Boise, Idaho, the Stevensons set up their presence at Mountain View Community Fellowship, finding a friend in the church’s pastor, Rev. Dr. Mamie O. Oliver, a woman who wears many hats at the church and is highly respected in the community. While in Boise, Pete sanded and primed walls in the preschool classroom, fixed ceiling tiles and wiring, replaced bulbs, did minor bathroom repairs, and painted orange caution stripes on the steps. Fran worked at the church-housed Community Ministries Center, preparing food boxes for needy families and helping prepare for the ordination service of LouRae Myhre-Weber, a woman who was ordained as a CBF chaplain. Together Fran and Pete helped package twelve boxes of books to be shipped to Nigeria that Pastor Oliver was donating to a school.

West Yellowstone, a small town, and Boise, a small mid-size city, are vastly different from the San Francisco Bay Area, the huge metropolitan area where the Stevensons live. Fran and Pete were inspired to see how God was working in areas of the country so different than their usual environment. In their time spent in Montana and Idaho, the Stevensons made some life-long friends and felt that giving of themselves during their mission trip adds richness to their own lives as they resume their normal routine. Fran says, “It was a pleasure to see how churches can thrive with vibrant pastors leading them to be the presence of Christ in their communities.”
